			The Tasmanian Government is responding to housing demand with unprecedented investment towards providing more social and affordable homes for Tasmanians in need. Additional funding has been provided towards housing and homelessness initiatives through Emergency Response, Commonwealth State Housing Agreement Debt Waiver and CHGP. Overall, total investment into housing and homelessness initiatives has expanded to over \$615 million over the next seven years, a record investment by any Government in Tasmania. This massive commitment will assist around 5 000 Tasmanians out of housing stress or homelessness by 30 June 2023 and provide a total of 3 500 new social houses to be built from 2021 through to 2027. Further demand analysis will be undertaken as part of the development of the Tasmanian Housing Strategy to inform future housing needs. See Tasmanian Housing Strategy.
